State bank moving closer to reality

The legislature is moving closer to making a state bank a reality, Senator Joe Nguyen told members and friends of the Metropolitan Democratic Club of Seattle at its August 14 meeting. The idea of a state bank has been championed for the last several years by MDC member Senator Bob Hasegawa, who has previously presented to the MDC on the subject.

The legislature last year contracted with the University of Washington to conduct a study to determine "what a state bank would look like," Mr Nguyen said. Once legislators have a handle on the scope and scale of a state bank, as well as the risks involved, legislation will be drafted. He expects a bill to be filed in the next session.

It would take \$100 million to capitalize a bank, Mr Nguyen explained, and public entities could participate in the capitalization. For example, he said, King County has \$8 billion in reserve funds that could be used to help capitalize a state bank. The bank could be used to fund a variety of public projects.

Mr Nguyen was elected to the state senate by the 34th legislative district in 2018. He is a senior manager at Microsoft.

"Our criminal justice system should be a reflection of who we are as a society," stressed Representative Roger Goodman (45th LD) at the August 28 meeting of the Metropolitan Democratic Club of Seattle. Mr Goodman, a long-time member of the MDC, is serving his seventh term in the House and is chair of the House Public Safety Committee.

Most of his work in the legislature now involves addressing the need for accountability and compassion in the justice system and working toward legislation that will accomplish the changes that can bring this about, Mr Goodman said. He discussed three priorities that he is working on, all aimed at reframing crime and justice.

The first priority: changing the way we deal with behavioral health issues. Forty percent of them – and also the most lethal – are eating disorders, he added, and we need to expand our capacity to treat them.

The Seattle Police Department gets 10,000 "stress" calls each year, Mr Goodman explained. Stress calls are not necessarily about crime, but about some form of public disorder caused by people with behavioral health issues. A new approach to stress calls is the Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion (LEAD) program, which calls for responding police to be accompanied by social workers. Together they intervene – not arrest – and refer the offender to health and social services.

His second priority: treating instead of punishing emerging adults. Most crimes

are committed by emerging adults, who are in the 16-25 age bracket, Mr Goodman said, and some of these crimes are serious and carry long sentences. Research shows that treating emerging adults differently by providing treatment and education reduces recidivism and costs, he stressed.

The third priority: reforming our sentencing system from top to bottom. Structured sentencing systems are too rigid, Mr Goodman said, and do not allow much discretion to judges. He has convened a task force of community and law enforcement representatives to review and recommend sentencing reform in Washington. The recommendations will lead to legislation that he hopes to introduce in the next session. The reforms, he believes, "will be a model for the nation."

Last year Mr Goodman led the process that resulted in the historic reforms that require all law enforcement officers in the state to receive violence de-escalation and mental health training and that amended the standard for justifiable use of deadly force.
